From the Rectory

Dear friends,

Happy Easter at this wonderful time of year where new life is all around us, and in our churches we celebrate the incredible Easter story. It's a story of extraordinary love and self-sacrifice, where life triumphs over death, bringing hope, new beginnings and transformation. It's a story about the power of forgiveness. It's a story that reminds us that rejection, betrayal, a sense of failure, traumatic loss and grief are not the end but can be the beginning of new life with new purpose. It's a story that opens the door to 'eternal life', that is life that is not held back by selfishness, judgement, darkness and negativity and the pain of the past, but life that embraces the future not with fear but with expectation that the best is yet to come. It's a story that does not end with the desire for revenge but with the words 'peace be with you'. It's an exciting and inspirational story; a pathway for life. It's an invitation to live an 'Easter' life.

We've got exciting times ahead of us in our Bride Valley and Chesil churches as we commit to living the Easter life. For example, at St Peter's Langton Herring we are celebrating the amazing new Community Choir. At St Martin's Shipton Gorge 'Breakfast Church' is flourishing, and we are looking forward to an opera concert in June. At St Nicholas' Abbotsbury we are excited about the 'Tree of Strings' concerts in July and our plans for a new disabled access restroom facility and servery.

Across all the parishes we are developing new pilgrimage routes which we plan to promote through the British Pilgrimage Trust and locally. All our beautiful churches are places of deep spiritual and historical significance located in areas of outstanding natural beauty. We have already been enjoying 'Pilgrimages of Peace' on shorter pilgrim routes. We celebrated St Bride's Day (1st February) with a successful pilgrimage on a longer route to the Othona Community and we look forward to confirming a route which connects all twelve churches. Pilgrimages are a great way to journey spiritually in the cathedral of creation; an opportunity to leave the past behind and walk in faith and hope of an Easter life, to enjoy and find more peace. In St Mary's Burton Bradstock we are waiting for planning permission to install a soft play facility in the south aisle of the church. This will be a three-metre square soft play structure with two levels and a slide for pre-school children to enjoy. Whilst it will be based geographically at one end of the benefice, we pray that it will benefit families with pre-school children from all the villages, providing opportunities to reduce isolation, make new connections and foster mutual support for parents and carers. We are particularly keen to see if this facility can be a support to children with special educational needs.

We are also prayerfully considering how we can continue to develop 'community fellowship', centred on the LATCH in Litton Cheney. We know that many are put off by 'religion', find traditional church services strange and unfamiliar, and frankly don't see the relevance of church. But we also know that there are significant social issues in our villages, including loneliness and broken relationships, and that some people find it difficult to just get through each day. 'Unresolved issues' was a phrase that came up in a recent conversation. Unresolved issues are painful, emotionally, and physically. They can literally choke us, paralyse us with anxiety and break our hearts. If our coping mechanism is an addiction, then they can ruin our lives. This is where the Easter story can be such a powerful paradigm and potential gateway to new life and new purpose. We don't have easy answers and formulas, but we want to offer kindness and compassion, and have confidence in the heart of our faith, that is the Easter story where 'unresolved issues' can be left at the foot of the cross, and the journey can continue onwards in the power of forgiveness and love to resurrection new life.

Easter love, joy, peace and prayers be with you,

Our Night Sky in March 2026

You should be able to see Venus setting in the West a couple of hours after sunset, while Jupiter and Orion still dominate the night sky. Mars, Mercury and Saturn will be rising in the East, but will be too close to the Sun to be visible.



The bottom, or centre of a black hole is called a singularity. It is a theoretical point of infinite density where matter is crushed, gravity is at its maximum, and the known laws of physics cease to apply. This point is surrounded by a boundary called the event horizon.

Key details about the singularity:

- **Infinite Density:** According to general relativity, all matter that enters a black hole is compressed into this infinitely small, infinitely dense point.
- **Physics Breakdown:** At the singularity, spacetime is so warped that current scientific theories, including gravity, cannot explain what occurs.
- **Not a Physical Surface:** While often called the "bottom," it is a point in space rather than a solid surface.
- **Unknown Nature:** Because the centre is hidden behind the event horizon (the point of no return), the exact nature of the singularity remains unknown.

The Bride Valley Book Club Review

Rachel Cusk's novel "**Outline**" was this month's choice. Cusk is well regarded in literary circles and has won prizes. We learned that "Outline" is the first novel in a trilogy - despite us being collectively quite well read - she was new to us as a writer.

There was a varied response to this book, some of us did not really engage with it but others enjoyed what was a more unusual approach to writing a contemporary novel. The first-person narrator is a creative writing teacher who has accepted a short contract in Athens during a very hot summer. We are told little about the writer and it is not clear whether it is Cusk herself or if she is assuming another persona. What follows is a series of intensely observed conversations with various people she meets. These include fellow travellers, other teachers of creative writing, her students, old friends living in Athens etc. Nothing of any consequence happens apart from these extended conversations which are remarkably one sided. Most of these focus on marital partnerships and relationships within families. There is an overshadowing mood of disappointment, failure and unmet expectations. Some of us thought this book was beautifully written but we did not all agree whether Cusk's approach held the reader's interest. The conversational encounters are often revealing and it is noticeable there is absolutely no small talk. Personal revelations, innermost doubts and regrets are voiced alongside intimate reflections and the baring of souls. Our narrator (whoever she is) is a very effective listener who "draws out" the people she meets. This is a particular type of contemporary novel which digs deep into the human experience of relationships and expands it to be offered up to the reader. There is not really

much of a story or a narrative arc. In some ways it is a novel about writing. Some of us questioned whether it is actually a novel at all - perhaps it is more akin to a journal? We enjoyed picking out some comedic moments, the narrator's naïveté, clever repetitions and the significance of "Outline" as a title choice. We did not all agree about this month's choice but we very much enjoyed our discussion.

Saunders Richardson Wood

Spring is definitely in the air – among the many birds singing away to attract mates, we have Tawny Owls calling. The famous 'twit twoo' sound isn't made by one bird – it's made by two. The female tawny owl makes the sharp 'ke-wick' (twit) sound, while the male responds with a wavering 'hoo-hoo' (twoo). Believe we found a Sparrowhawk pellet – could clearly see bones from a small bird within it. Primroses are in bloom, Celandine carpet the wood floor, and Elf Cup fungus spotted. Some Bird Cherry saplings have been planted up in the wood by one of our members. If walking along Smacombe Lane you will see that the laid hedge is greening up. We will open the Wood on **Saturday 25th April at 2.30pm**. Bluebells should be showing by then, and we know that the nettles will need to be cleared from the tracks before they take hold. This is a members' only event but we can sign you up on the day and there is no charge to join.

The top border has been tidied and much of the Rosebay Willow Herb has been removed and the Buddleias have been pruned right back. Apologies that due to illness, we could not hold the pruning workshop this year – we do run this annually so look out for notices later on in the year. We will be in the Orchard on **Monday 13th April at 11.00am** for another maintenance session. All Shipton Gorge residents are welcome, just come prepared with robust gardening gloves. As previously mentioned, the top border does need a bit of a refresh with more pollinator friendly plants put in - If anyone would like to volunteer to oversee this, please let us know – we just need some thoughts and ideas.

Slowly but surely the required elements need to be in place, before the Parish Plan steering group begins its work, are coming together. More steering group members are required, but we hope to be in a position for the group to hold its inaugural meeting in April/May.

What's In a Name....

The name **Litton** means 'farmstead or settlement on the stream called Hlyde', 'the noisy one' (meaning loud stream, torrent) from Old English, the Cheney part of the village name came in the 14th century when the Cheney family became part owners of the manor.

So, it should not be a surprise that when there is a sustained spell of rainfall that this will then emerge through the many springs that are dotted around the village. Water under pressure will find the path of least resistance and sometimes that means it may be on the carriageway, most notably on Main Street over Christmas and New Year and more recently between the entrance to Baglake and Hine's Mead Lane. The blockage that caused the water to spill out on to the road on Main Street was an accumulation of debris in the underground water course, this debris is now just further down "stream" and needs removing.

As for the water coming down from the spring at Baglake, that is an excess of surface water overloading the culvert, and unfortunately this is causing damage to the road surface. Dorset Council have looked at the issue a few times and the conclusion is that, until the water levels drop, they are unable to carry out repairs to the road surface. In the meantime, the council has placed "Road Closed" signs to avoid damage to vehicles from the raised manhole. So, please be aware, that if you chose to drive through the road closure and do damage your vehicle, then you do so at your own risk. Typically, the rainfall on the hillside takes around 3 months to drain away so repairs are going to be a while coming.

in years to come we hope they will grow & blossom and be enjoyed by all. Thanks to the Woodland Trust for the donation and all who turned out to help.

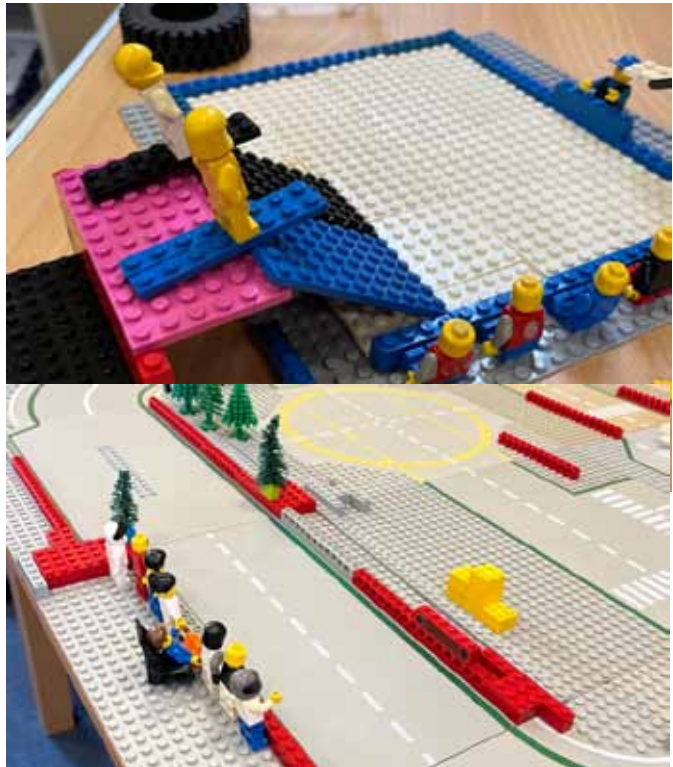
On 18th March our Spring Lunch was at our very own local, the Three Horseshoes and was wonderfully well attended. As usual the food, company and conversation were very enjoyable.

At the end of March we bade farewell to Tom and Kelly Foot and their children Neve, James, Beau and Ivy; and Craig and Amy Chandler and their sons Lewis and Harris. We wish them all every happiness in their new homes; and the good news is that Tom and his team [and of course the herd of cows!] will still be very much in evidence in the fields at the top end of the valley, and Open Air Dairy Cheddar will still be available locally.

We must hope that people will soon move into the empty houses; and that they will contribute as much to our small community as these two lovely families.

The Rev Dr Gary Bowness continues his tongue-in-cheek letters from Uncle Eustace

My dear Nephew Darren,



So, you are about to run an Alpha course in your parish; I am sure your bishop will be delighted. I remember him from my Oxford days. He was just starting his course as a gangly undergraduate when I was finishing my doctorate on Eusebius.

I recall him as a keen rugby player who took early morning dips in the Isis, who led intense discussions on Saint Paul's theology of 'the body' over cups of cocoa in the evenings in his rooms and who spent his holidays laying paths for the National Trust in the Lake District while lodging in Youth Hostels. He's exactly the sort of person who will empathise with your ministry - hearty, enthusiastic and overflowing with compassionate intensity. We were not close friends.

We tend not to go in for those sorts of things, here at St James the Least of All, preferring matters a little more relaxed and understated. If we ever do hold discussion groups (and they are a regrettable necessity during Lent), they always start with a good lunch, finishing with coffee and one of Mrs French's excellent Madeira cakes. Once we have removed from the table, those who manage to stay awake will start to tackle the chosen topic.

However, we always seem to veer off to discussing more interesting matters, such as why Colonel Chorley is never allowed to sing solos in the choir anymore, or who moved Mrs Cholmondeley's flower arrangement from the font the previous week. Apparently, she has given notice that her weekly contributions on the plate will be much reduced unless an appropriate apology is received.

These matters may not seem as important to you as deciding what the 'white stone' in Revelation 4 is all about, but let me assure you that to members of our congregation, knowing why the second verse of the National Anthem is no longer sung at our Remembrance Services is of pivotal importance.

At 2.30pm we wake up those who have enjoyed an hour's slumber and totter off home, knowing we have once again done our bit for faith in the parish. I am sure your own group will also return home after your sessions - even if a digestive biscuit and weak tea is all that has been offered - invigorated and braced to tackle the heathen in the parish. We all take our pleasures in different ways.

William Law, spiritual writer extraordinary Died on 9 April 1761

William Law is the saint for anyone forced to choose between losing their job or losing their integrity.

It had all begun so straightforwardly. Born in King's Cliffe, Northamptonshire in 1686, William had studied at Emmanuel College Cambridge, been ordained a deacon, and been made a Fellow of the college in 1711. But soon politics interfered. At his ordination, William had made his Oath of Allegiance to the House of Stuart. But with the accession of the first Hanoverian monarch, King George I in 1714, William found he was now expected to make his Oath of Allegiance to King George I. This he felt he could not do, with any integrity. But without the Oath, William lost his Fellowship, and was unable to be priested.

It would have been a bitter blow to anyone wanting a career in the Church, but William did not change his mind. He wanted more than a career in the Church, he wanted to live a holy life before God, and to keep his conscience clear. And so he spent many years as a simple curate (he was not priested until 1728), living by tutoring, but also writing extensively.

And it was through his writings that William Law went on to make a lasting impact on the spirituality of the nation. One of his numerous books, *A Serious Call to a Devout and Holy Life*, is recognised as having had more influence on the English people than any other English post-Reformation spiritual work, except Pilgrim's Progress.

William Law's writing greatly influenced the leaders of the evangelical movement of his day, including John and Charles Wesley, and George Whitefield. Law was also praised by Enlightenment thinkers such as the writer Dr Samuel Johnson and the historian Edward Gibbon.

And 20 years after his death in 1761, William Wilberforce, the politician, philanthropist, and leader of the movement to stop the slave trade, also paid tribute to the effect Law's writing had had on him. Law's spiritual writings remain in print even today – nearly 300 years later.

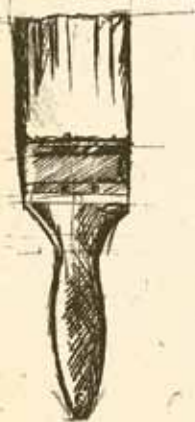

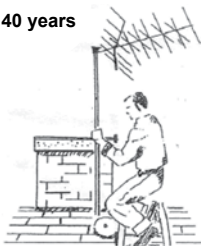
