From the Rectory

Dear friends,

I've just come off the phone listening to someone talk about relationship difficulties with their neighbours. Earlier in the week I was chatting with someone about disputes between neighbours over garden trees. Today, on newsfeeds and social media I have been reading about protests and riots happening in towns and cities in response to recent horrific incidents of violence on the streets of Southampton and Belfast. And it all makes me wonder and reflect on the words of Jesus 'to love our neighbour', particularly when in Jesus's parable of 'The Good Samaritan' we are challenged to consider our neighbour to be those very people we find it most difficult to love, or have been raised or conditioned to see not as 'neighbours' but as 'enemies'. Right now, with greater polarisation politically, the promotion of 'enemies' seems to be increasing.

If we look a bit closer at 'love your neighbour' in the Bible, we find that the command is 'to love your neighbour as yourself.' It's like 'The Golden Rule' which has featured in cultures and religions throughout history: "Do to other as you would have them do to you" (Jesus) or "What you do not wish for yourself, do not do to others" (Confucius). Perhaps if we do not love really ourselves, or we do not feel loved ourselves, then we find it more difficult to love others. Also, if our view and experience of love is linked to fear and punishment then that may influence our ability to love others. Writing about love, I'm writing about kindness and consideration, about acceptance and understanding, and most particularly about empathy. Empathy helps us to try and see things from another person's perspective, to put ourselves in another person's shoes, and to try and imagine what things are like, and have been like for them. Is there a violent person out there who has not experienced direct violence in their own life, most likely in childhood where they had no control over the situation?

It can be difficult to empathise with another person if we are so taken up with our own unresolved deep pain, which can lead to the need to always be in control, to always be in the right, to even dominate situations, and try and manipulate for our own sense of righthood or power or esteem. Without knowing it we are trying to make up for our own lack of love and emotional stability; the only person with needs is us. The only victim out there, we may think, is me.

There's a powerful verse in the Bible: 'There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear.' (1 John 4:18). Faced with our own human needs and fears, faced with our own emotional weaknesses, none of us are going to be able to love

perfectly, and we are going to find it extremely difficult to love everybody, whether they be our next-door neighbours, or fellow human 'neighbours' we only see on TV screens or social media. But instead of being influenced by fear or 'popularist' reactions, all of us can take some time to reflect on 'love your neighbour as yourself' and think about changes we could make, starting with being honest with ourselves.

If we need to forgive and let go to free us up to love, we can think about that. If we need to practise and develop empathy instead of judging and condemning, we can think about that. If we need to empathise with ourselves, to let go of shame and blame, we can think about that. If we need to believe and put our trust in a higher love, a perfect love, a divine love, an all-forgiving love, we can think about that: "Ask, and it shall be given you; seek, and ye shall find; knock, and it shall be opened unto you:" We can't control or change the past. We can only control or change ourselves today, to make a better tomorrow for ourselves and others, where everyone feels safe and secure to love and be loved.

The Bride Valley Book Club Review

Yellowface by Rebecca Kuang

This story certainly shouts for attention with its insulting title and brightly coloured cover. Rebecca Kuang's novel is a departure from her previously successful fantasy books. Set in contemporary Washington DC, June Hayward is a young white writer struggling to be successful in the highly competitive world of publishing. June is jealous of her friend (not a close friend) and college contemporary, Athena Liu, (second generation American/Chinese) who is already a best-selling author, much admired and in the media spotlight. Athena dies in a freak accident witnessed by June who then steals her outline manuscript, a story about Chinese labourers during WW2. June is confident that no one else has seen this manuscript and begins the process of turning its outline into a fully developed draft novel.

She approaches an independent publishing house and changes her name from June Hayward to Juniper Song. Initially she is very successful and experiences all the accolades and attention given to her erstwhile rival Athena. Doubts about her authorship start to circulate on social media and despite efforts to head off these rumours - June/Juniper's reputation is trashed. Some critics question whether June/Juniper (definitely not of Chinese heritage) should be writing this story. Matters become confused by the Asian sounding name "Song" chosen by June/Juniper and she is accused of "cultural appropriation" which leads to her being "cancelled" by the literary/publishing world.

This novel reflects many current controversies in publishing circles. What exactly counts as plagiarism these days? How do we navigate "differences" in our society? Who exactly has ownership of stories rooted in ethnic history and experience? How has social media changed the way conduct this debate?

"Yellowface" very much got the thumbs down from everyone except two of us. Criticisms were harsh - too long - self-obsessed - unlikeable characters - uncertainty as to whether it is meant to be a satirical expose - nasty - shallow - devious - amoral - biased towards a much younger American audience - focussed on the worst aspects of human nature etc. Or - on the other hand - an entertaining account of a literary heist - the fickleness of the publishing milieu and the shark infested waters of social media when shaming an individual. It was a spirited discussion but not one which changed opinions.

Be Tick Aware This Summer

As the weather improves and more of us enjoy time outdoors, it's important to stay "tick aware."

Ticks are tiny, spider-like creatures that live in places such as long grass, woodland, parks and even gardens. They attach to skin and feed on blood and are most active from spring to autumn.



How to reduce your risk

- Stick to clear paths and avoid brushing against long grass
- Wear light-coloured clothing to spot ticks more easily
- Use insect repellent
- Check yourself, children, and pets regularly – especially skin folds, hairline, and behind knees

If you find a tick

- Remove it as soon as possible using fine-tipped tweezers
- Pull upwards slowly and clean the area
- Keep an eye on the bite for a few weeks

When to seek advice

Contact your GP or NHS 111 if you develop:

- A spreading circular (bullseye) rash
- Flu-like symptoms, fatigue, or joint pain after a bite

While most bites are harmless, ticks can sometimes spread infections such as Lyme disease. Early removal and prompt advice are key.

Our Night Sky in July 2026

Anyone who has gone out just after sunset, and the sky's darkening, will have seen Venus high in the Western sky. It will remain dominant until it starts its downwards journey towards the horizon in August So, just enjoy its undoubted beauty for the next months.



James Webb telescope has found thousands of “Little Red Dots” in one of its latest images. The team thinks that Little Red Dots like QS01 cannot have been rare in the early universe, and is in the process of analysing similar objects to find out whether supermassive black holes actually do predate the galaxies where they currently reside.

QS01's black hole is immense — roughly 50 million solar masses — it makes up, at a minimum, an astonishing two-thirds of QS01's total mass. This proportion is thousands of times greater than in nearby galaxies, where supermassive black holes make up only a tiny fraction of the host galaxy's total mass.

The volume of new information being gathered by the New Telescopes is staggering, and is threatening to make my tiny brain crumble! But I will try to continue my monthly contributions to the BVN.

Road or River?

During the second half of the nineteenth century there were significant improvements in public health and amenities in Littlebredy. The river was diverted to provide water for the Walled Garden, and a comprehensive water and sewage system [state-of-the art at the time] was installed. The water was piped from springs near the lake at Bridehead, and has provided a near-constant supply of good drinking water ever since.

Over the years the pipes have rusted, and it has become a constant struggle to keep the infrastructure in good working order. Recently, work has been carried out to update the pumping system, so improvements are literally 'in the pipeline'.

Since the very heavy rains during January and February, when the ground was saturated and springs appeared in the most unlikely places, a small trickle running down the lane towards the Walled Garden appeared.

What is more puzzling is that it hasn't dried up; in fact, it's got progressively stronger, so that there is now a constant stream running, and a large puddle near the gate into the Walled Garden grounds. Hopefully something will be done to rectify the problem soon, before we all start to grow webbed feet!

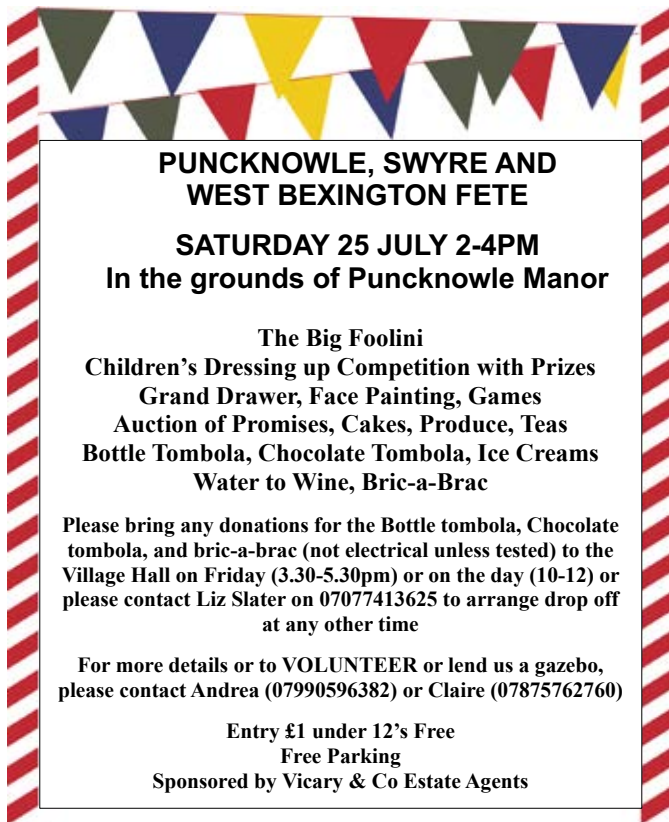

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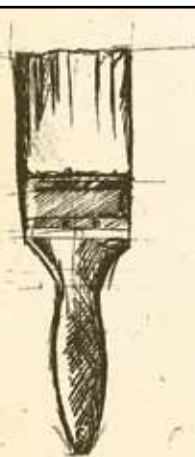
